WHAT IS P-TECH?

When a Desk and Derrick member **hears** someone say "PETEX," they think of the Fundamentals of Petroleum Correspondence Course offered through the Continuing Education Division at the University of Texas. But, when Keith Tolleson says "P-Tech," it may sound the same, but it is a shortened version of Process Technology.

Process Technology is a two year Associates Degree Program offered at the Elaine Nunez Community College in Chalmette, Louisiana. There, they train technicians and operators to work in oil and gas, petroleum, refining, and the chemical engineering industries. The program gives students a "heads-up" to get into specialized training with a company, i.e. pulping paper, drilling, production, or refining. Process Technology comprises many different areas and companies are very supportive of the graduates. Industry drives these companies. They do things their way, for the area in which they live.

There are over 300 major facilities from the mouth of the river to Baton Rouge that need operators – experienced people to fill jobs. There is a need for technicians in Process Technology. These are some of the highest paying jobs in Louisiana. These are professional jobs. Women who complete the program are very suited to Process Technology. Their communication skills are better than men. They have an advantage when it comes to computer and clerical skills. More and more women are getting involved and they are always at the top of their class. It is a knowledge-based course including chemistry and physics. Turn around in P-Tech is good as "new blood" is ready to step in when those eligible for retirement do so.

The #1 skill needed in Process Technology, is COMMUNICATION. It is **vital.** It is the main skill needed to succeed. Business = Communication. Process Technology is the study of process, the application, maintenance, and operation of a unit that converts raw material into a finished product. Industry has a need for Process Technology, and Nunez College teaches all aspects of it: Instrumentation, equipment, trouble shooting, whatever.

Exxon and Chevron gave birth to this new program and Keith was called to be in on the ground floor. Unfortunately, 72 hours after he was hired, *Katrina* hit. With the massive devastation in St. Bernard Parish, the Federal Government wanted to bulldoze the college, but industry was staying. They were not going to relocate. So, Nunez stayed and started cleaning up and gearing up. One year after *Katrina*, Process Technology had the most students of any program at Nunez, including the nursing program.

Nunez is nationally certified with three national organizations and accredited with CAPT (Center for the Advancement of Process Technology). They meet all of their bylaws and

credentials through CAPT. They are also part of GCPTA (Gulf Coast Process Technology Alliance). Nunez had the first Process Technology course in the United States to be certified and accredited through NAIT (National Association for Industrial Technology). Whatever course a student takes, it is their fingerprint for life. If they transfer they still get credit. It is recognized all over. This is a national curriculum.

Nunez also has an internship program which lasts for three months, where students get paid by the company. This is a win-win situation as the student increases his education and the company experiences a trial period of a potential new employee. Once a student decides to pursue this, he must commit and apply himself. Behaviors must change. **There are no short cuts.** You can not fake it. Can you imagine the networking that occurs during this internship? Students are as excited to get involved as the companies are to have them.

A question was asked if the Associates Degree can be applied to a four-year program, and it can. The Process Technology classes are a block of classes in the 300 level. When entering a four-year program, one would only need an additional 18 months to get that degree. Currently Nicholls State University will allow you to pursue a Petroleum Service Degree. This includes management, safety, and process/operations.

Another question was asked about the age of the students. There is a wide, mixed range. A 40 or 50 year-old could easily be sitting next to an 18 year-old.

When it comes to education, Keith known of what he speaks. He had worked in oil and gas in the Gulf of Mexico for 14 years and had been out of school for that period of time when things started going downhill in the 1980s. He decided to go back to school at Nicholls for his teaching degree. After teaching for 10 years, he got the call from Nunez and has been with them 4 years. Although not now in school, Keith considers that he is still adding to his education. He stated that every time he speaks to a group he also learns something about that group, thus enhancing his education.

Keith brought along a promotional video of interviews of current and past students in Process Technology. They documented that the earnings are above average with good benefits and there are many advantages for advancement.

It is quite possible that Westbank will advance to an industry seminar on Process Technology before the end of this year.

Vitamins: What You Should Know

Vitamins are natural substances found in plants and animals. Your body uses these substances to stay healthy and support its many functions. There are two types of vitamins: water-soluble and fat-soluble.

What are water-soluble vitamins?

Water-soluble vitamins are easily absorbed by your body. Unlike fat-soluble vitamins, they don't have to be absorbed using bile acids (fluids used to digest fats). Your body doesn't store large amounts of water-soluble vitamins. The water-soluble vitamins you don't need are removed by your kidneys and come out in your urine.

Vitamins B complex, including thiamine, riboflavin, niacin, B6 (pyridoxine), folacin, B12 (cyanocobalamin), pantothenic acid, biotin and vitamin C, as well as PABA, inositol and choline are all water soluble and are therefore classed as "water-soluble vitamins".

Although PABA, inositol and choline are listed here, their classification as vitamins is sometimes questioned.

<u>Vitamin B Complex</u> actually refers to a selection of nutrients with some very similar properties, but they are separate nutrients, although most of them work in synergy. These similarities made researchers first think on one vitamin alone, but after full investigation it was found that there were in actual fact several factors included in this one term – hence the group was called the vitamin B complex with each fraction receiving a separate designation, letter, descriptive name or chemical term.

All these nutrients are soluble in water and are distributed in many common foods with many similarities in dietary sources.

Vitamin B1 or **Thiamin**, is used in many different body functions and deficiencies may have far reaching effects on the body, yet very little of this vitamin is stored in the body, and depletion of this vitamin can happen within 14 days.

Thiamin is also a miraculous nutrient, somebody suffering from beriberi, scarcely able to lift their head from their pillow, will respond quickly from injected thiamin, and will be on their feet within a matter of hours. Thiamin may enhance circulation, helps with blood formation and the metabolism of carbohydrates. It is also required

for the health of the nervous system and is used in the biosynthesis of a number of cell constituents. It also aids in digestion as it is used in the manufacture of hydrochloric acid. It is also great for the brain and may help with depression and assist in memory and learning.

Vitamin B2 or **Riboflavin** is manufactured in the body by the intestinal flora and is easily absorbed. Very small quantities are stored so there is a constant need for this vitamin.

The body requires it for the use of oxygen and the metabolism of amino acids, fatty acids, and carbohydrates. Riboflavin is further needed to activate vitamin B6 (pyridoxine), helps to create niacin and assists the adrenal gland. It may be used for red blood cell formation, antibody production, cell respiration, and growth. Although it is needed for periods of rapid growth, it is also needed when protein intake is high, and is most beneficial to the skin, hair and nails.

Vitamin B3 or **Niacin** can be manufactured by the body. Niacin is derived from two compounds - nicotinic acid and niacinamide.

Vitamin B3 is required for cell respiration, helps in the release of energy and metabolism of carbohydrates, fats, and proteins, proper circulation and healthy skin, functioning of the nervous system, and normal secretion of bile and stomach fluids. It is used in the synthesis of sex hormones, treating schizophrenia and other mental illnesses, and a memory-enhancer. Nicotinic acid (but not nicotinamide) given in drug dosage improves the blood cholesterol profile, and has been used to clear the body of organic poisons, such as certain insecticides. People report more mental alertness when this vitamin is in sufficient supply.

Vitamin B5 or **Pantothenic acid**, known also as the "anti-stress vitamin" is part of the B group vitamins and classified as a water-soluble vitamin. This nutrient can be manufactured in the body by the intestinal flora.

Vitamin B5 plays an important role in the secretion of hormones, such as cortisone because of the role it plays in supporting the adrenal gland. These hormones assist the metabolism, help to fight allergies and are beneficial in the maintenance of healthy skin, muscles and nerves. Pantothenic acid is used in the release of energy as well as the metabolism of fat, protein and carbohydrates. It is used in the creation of lipids, neurotransmitters, steroid hormones and hemoglobin. Some are of the opinion that pantothenic acid is also helpful to fight wrinkles as well as graying of the hair.

Vitamin B6 or **Pyridoxine** is part of the B group vitamins and is required for both mental and physical health.

Pyridoxine is required for the balancing of hormonal changes in women as well as assisting the immune system and the growth of new cells. It is also used in the processing and metabolism of proteins, fats and carbohydrates, while assisting with controlling your mood as well as your behavior. Pyridoxine might also be of benefit for children with learning difficulties, as well as assisting in the prevention of dandruff, eczema and psoriasis. It assists in the balancing of sodium and potassium as well promotes red blood cell production. It is further involved in the nucleic acids RNA as well as DNA. It is further linked to cancer immunity and fights the formation of the toxic chemical homocysteine, which is detrimental to the heart muscle.

When low on B6, women may suffer from pre-menstrual fluid retention, severe period pains, emotional PMS symptoms, premenstrual acne and nausea in early pregnancy. Mood swings, depression as well as loss of sexual drive is sometimes noted when pyridoxine is in short supply and the person is on hormone replacement therapy or on birth control pills.

Vitamin B9 or **Folic acid**, is also referred to as folacin or folate and its chemical name is pteroylglutamic acid. This vitamin can be manufactured by the body and be stored in the liver.

Folic acid is required for DNA synthesis and cell growth and is important for red blood cell formation, energy production as well as the forming of amino acids. Folic acid is essential for creating heme, the iron containing substance in hemoglobin, crucial for oxygen transport. It is important for healthy cell division and replication, since it is involved as a coenzyme for RNA and DNA synthesis. It is also required for protein metabolism and in treating folic acid anemia. Folic acid also assists in digestion, and the nervous system, and works at improving mental as well as emotional health. This nutrient may be effective in treating depression and anxiety. Folic acid is very important in the development of the nervous system of a developing fetus.

Vitamin B12 or Cyanocobamin and Cobolamin is known as the energy vitamin and has been a widely researched vitamin, and used in supplementation to a very large degree.

Cobolamin is needed in the manufacture of red blood cells and the maintenance of red blood cells and it stimulates appetite, promotes growth and release of energy. It is often used with older people to give an energy boost, assist in preventing mental deterioration and helps with speeding up thought processes. Some people are also of the opinion that it helps with clearing up infections and provides protection against allergies and cancer. This vitamin is also used in the metabolism of fats, proteins and carbohydrates

Vitamin H or **Biotin** is part of the Vitamin B Complex group. Vitamin H is used in cell growth, the production of fatty acids, metabolism of fats, and proteins. It plays a role in the Kreb cycle, which is the process in which energy is released from food.

Biotin is also indicated for healthy hair and skin, healthy sweat glands, nerve tissue, and bone marrow, and assisting with muscle pain. Vitamin H not only assists in various metabolic chemical conversions, but also helps with the transfer of carbon dioxide. Biotin is also helpful in maintaining a steady blood sugar level.

Vitamin C or **Ascorbic acid** is also known as L-ascorbic acid, dehydroascorbic acid, the antiscorbutic vitamin, L-xyloascorbic acid and L-threo-hex-2-uronic acidy-lactone. It is a much talked about vitamin, with people claiming it as a cure-all for many diseases and problems - from cancer to the common cold. <u>Yet, this miracle vitamin cannot be manufactured by the body, and needs to be ingested</u>.

Vitamin C is required in the synthesis of collagen in connective tissue, neurotransmitters, steroid hormones, carnitine, conversion of cholesterol to bile acids and enhances iron bioavailability. Ascorbic acid is a great antioxidant and helps protect the body against pollutants. Because Vitamin C is a biological reducing agent, it is also linked to prevention of degenerative diseases - such as cataracts, certain cancers and cardiovascular diseases.

Ascorbic acid also promotes healthy cell development, proper calcium absorption, normal tissue growth and repair - such as healing of wounds and burns. It assists in the prevention of blood clotting and bruising, and strengthening the walls of the capillaries. Vitamin C is needed for healthy gums, to help protect against infection, and assisting with clearing up infections and is thought to enhance the immune system and help reduce cholesterol levels, high blood pressure and preventing arteriosclerosis.

PABA or **Para-aminobenzoic acid** is often thought of as only an ingredient used in sunscreens, while it is in actual fact a nutritional ingredient as well. Since it is a moiety of PGA, a form of folic acid, some health professionals do not consider it a vitamin, but only a B-complex factor.

PABA is used to improve the protein used in the body, it relates to red blood cell formation as well as assisting the manufacture of folic acid in the intestines. Para-aminobenzoic acid is used in sunscreen preparations since it can help protect the skin against ultra-violet radiation. It has been linked to hair growth as

well as reversing the graying of hair, but these results are disappointing. People suffering from vitiligo, over-pigmentation of skin, or without pigment in some spots, have reported an improvement of the skin after more PABA was ingested.

Choline's metabolism is closely interrelated to that of methionine, and methyl-folate, yet choline is at times treated by some nutritional specialists as a stepchild in nutrition.

Choline assists in controlling your weight as well as cholesterol levels, keeping cell membranes healthy and in preventing gallstones. It is also most useful in the maintenance of the nervous system, assisting memory and learning, and may help to fight infections, including hepatitis and AIDS. Choline is critical for normal membrane structure and function.

Inositol is needed for health at cellular level and a fair concentration is found in the lens of the human eye as well as the heart.

Inositol plays an important part in the health of cell membranes especially the specialized cells in the brain, bone marrow, eyes and intestines. The function of the cell membranes is to regulate the contents of the cells, which makes effective functioning possible. Inositol is said to promote healthy hair, hair growth, and helps in controlling estrogen levels and may assist in preventing breast lumps. It may also be of benefit in reducing blood cholesterol levels.


