


CLUB PURPOSE

ADDC Proposed Bylaw Amendments

Proposed Amendment Number 1

Amend Article II – Purpose by adding "and to educate the general public about these industries" at the end of the sentence.

Now Reads:

The purpose of the Association shall be to promote the education and professional development of individuals employed in or affiliated with the petroleum, energy, and allied industries.

Amend to Read:

The purpose of the Association shall be to promote the education and professional development of individuals employed in or affiliated with the petroleum, energy, and allied industries <u>and to educate the general public about these industries</u>.

Rationale:

This proposed amendment is based on discussions with Mike Gray, CPA and follow up with Allison McGrath Gardner, Attorney with Conner & Winters. We needed to make some changes in the ADDC purpose; otherwise our Energy Activity Book sales could possibly be considered unrelated business income. To avoid the application of UBIT (Unrelated Business Income Tax), the distribution of the EAB must contribute importantly to the Association's tax exempt purpose. Because the distribution of the Books promotes the education of elementary school children, not individuals employed in or affiliated with the petroleum, energy or allied industries, the IRS could argue that the sale of the EAB is outside the scope of the Association's exempt purposes. This proposed amendment would ensure that there can be no question that the sale of the EAB contributes to the Association's exempt purposes.

I am for the proposed amendments in order to have our bylaws meet the Association's exempt purpose.

Educating the public is covered in our Mission Statement, but if the professionals think it should also be added to our purpose, then we should do so. The wording they suggest is simple and straight forward.

The proposed amendment serves a two-fold purpose. It reflects our purpose more fully since we not only educate our members but go beyond and provide educational opportunities for the general public too as well as addressing the issue of Unrelated Business Income Tax.

Proposed Amendment Number 2

Amend Article X – Duties of Officers, Section 5 by striking the word "audit" between the words "for" and "at" and inserting the words "review by an independent certified public accounting firm".

Now Reads:

The Treasurer shall supervise the collection and disbursements of all funds of the Association as directed by the Association Board of Directors; shall furnish the Board of Directors with a quarterly statement of income and expenditures; shall submit the Association books for <u>audit</u> at the close of each fiscal year or as directed by the Board of Directors; and shall submit a written report at least twice annually to the clubs. The Treasurer shall furnish a surety bond in an amount fixed by the Board of Directors, the cost of which shall be borne by the Association. The Treasurer shall prepare a budget at the beginning of the year to be submitted to the Board of Directors for their consideration and shall perform such other duties as may be required of the office.

Amend to Read:

The Treasurer shall supervise the collection and disbursements of all funds of the Association as directed by the Board of Directors; shall furnish the Board of Directors with a quarterly statement of income and expenditures; shall submit the Association books for review by an independent certified public accounting firm at the close of each fiscal year or as directed by the Board of Directors; and shall submit a written report at least twice annually to the clubs. The Treasurer shall furnish a surety bond in an amount fixed by the Board of Directors, the cost of which shall be borne by the Association. The Treasurer shall prepare a budget at the beginning of the year to be submitted to the Board of Directors for their consideration and shall perform such other duties as may be required of the office.

Rationale:

Prior to commencing work on the 2007 financial statements, it was recommended by Mike Gray, CPA, who has been the Association auditor for several years, that we change from audited to reviewed financial statements. The American Institute of Certified Public Accountant's Auditing Standards Board instituted 10 amendments to existing auditing standards. These new amendments significantly increase the work required to issue audited financial statements. The new amendments require an in depth risk assessment, a more rigorous assessment of material misstatement and an improved linkage between the assessed risk and nature, timing and extent of audit procedures performed in response to those risks.

Audits must be conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States. An audit includes assessing the overall accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating overall financial statement presentation. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.

After assessing the Association's accounting procedures currently being used as well as the cost comparison between an audit and review, the board of directors believe that an annual review of the Financial Statements will be sufficient.

This change still ensures that appropriate procedures are met and will not affect the integrity of our organization.

A lot of businesses are changing from an audit to a review because new audit requirements are so time consuming which translates to higher fees. I think this is a good move. Since we report on the cash basis we will lose little or no actual quality work. However, I think the insertion should read "review by an independent certified public accountant" instead of "accounting firm."

A review is so much simpler and less costly.

As noted in the rationale, the Association has numerous procedures in place in regards to accounting and an annual review should be sufficient.

Proposed Amendment Number 3

Amend Bylaws by adding a new **Article XXIII—Dissolution Clause** and renumbering the following Articles accordingly.

Now reads:

Amend to Read:

<u>Upon the dissolution of the Association, the Board of Directors will, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Association, distribute all of the assets of the Association to an organization which qualifies as an exempt</u>

organization under Section 501(c)(3) or Section 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law at such time as the Board of Directors will determine. Any of such assets not so disposed of will be disposed of by the District Court of the County in which the principal office of the Association is then located to such organization or organizations as said Court will determine which are organized and operated exclusively for such exempt purposes.

RATIONALE

It is required by the IRS to have a dissolution clause in our bylaws. At the 2007 ADDC Convention, the delegates were asked to vote on adding a proposed dissolution clause to the bylaws. The proposed amendment was referred to committee to study the issue in more detail. The Dissolution Review Committee was asked to present a proposed amendment to the 2009 Rules Committee for consideration at the 2009 ADDC Convention. Katherine G. Coyle, an attorney with Conner & Winters, suggested the wording for this dissolution clause.



LOOP DE LOOP

We have a LOOP (Louisiana Offshore Oil Port) in our own backyard. LOOP is the **only** place in the United States than can offload crude oil from VLCC (Very Large Crude Carriers). LOOP is located just 20 miles south from Grand Isle in the Gulf of Mexico in 110 feet of water. This location is needed for VLCC that have an 85 foot depth when loaded. LOOP has handled the largest ship in the world, the *Jahre Viking*, with a capacity of 4.2 Million barrels of crude. Before there was a LOOP, the massive supertankers had to be offloaded to smaller ships that were able to navigate the smaller inland shipping channels. This was very time consuming and often resulted in spills. Now with LOOP, all that has changed and there is no need for offloading to smaller ships. LOOP is the greatest single point of entry for imported oil in the nation.

LOOP is comprised of two platforms connected by a walkway. The smaller platform includes vessel traffic control, sleeping and eating quarters for the workers and a heliport. The larger one is the marine terminal, the pumping station. The entire LOOP complex is operated from a control center at Galliano, Louisiana. It is operational 24/7. Here is where all activities are monitored, pumps stop and start, and the flow of crude is measured and controlled.

LOOP moves 1 Million barrels of crude each day, 10% of all petroleum imported into the United States. Here is how to LOOP de LOOP:

- Supertankers tie up at one of three single point mooring buoys located 1.5 miles from the platform.
- Floating hoses are attached to an underwater pipeline at the base of the mooring buoy.
- Once the system is ready, the tanker is notified and discharge begins.
- Crude goes from tanker to hose to the pipeline at the marine terminal.
- Diesel pumps increase the pressure and the flow rate and volume is measured through a 48 inch pipeline to Port Fourchon.
- From Fourchon, four more pumps again move the pressure and increase the flow rate as the crude moves to Clovelly, 3 miles west of Galliano, for storage in underground salt domes or tank farms.
- At Clovelly, the crude is again measured before being injected into the salt domes.

Clovelly has eight operative caverns for storage. The capacity of a single cavern is equal to twenty 300,000 barrels of above the ground storage tanks. The salt domes have a 53 Million barrel storage capacity. Currently there is anywhere from 15 Million to 30 Million barrels stored. LOOP estimates that there is a 25 year life span in these caverns.

LOOP is owned by Shell, Marathon, and Murphy. Fifty percent of the volume entering the port is from foreign oil non-owner companies. Marathon, being a part owner, does not get any special consideration for shipments through LOOP. They have to bid for space just as anyone else does. The port operates as a common carrier facility, so any company that meets its terms and conditions of service can ship barrels. Marathon is currently undergoing a \$3.4 Billion expansion in Garyville, Louisiana which will make it the fourth largest refinery. Marathon credits LOOP for part of the decision to launch this project.

The demand for foreign oil has doubled. The port receives as much foreign oil as it can handle. It also handles domestic crude with pipelines tied to BP's Thunder Horse field and to MARS. More links are planned. Five hundred to 550 barrels of domestic oil from the Gulf of Mexico (about 10% of domestic production) is handled by LOOP. MARS has a separate pipeline from LOOP and LOOP has constructed a ninth cavern just to store the crude from MARS.

Galliano directs the crude from the tankers to the pipeline and to storage. When crude is requested by a refinery from storage, the crude is moved in measured batches to the requesting refinery, receiving only what they need to process, thus avoiding excess.

Five different pipelines connect the storage facility to over 50% of the nation's refinery capacity. One pipeline goes to Lake Charles, Louisiana and Port Arthur, Texas. Three service Louisiana. The fifth is connected to CAPLINE – a pipeline extending from St. James, Louisiana to Patoka, Illinois and from there to smaller pipelines to the Midwest and as far north as Canada. Nothing goes to the east coast or the west coast, but anything in the middle is accessible. It is a good bet that the next time you put gas in your car, the crude came through LOOP.

LOOP is more than half-way through a \$180 Million expansion of building twelve 600,000 barrel storage tanks. These tanks are 50 feet tall and 315 feet in diameter. (Think football field.) The final three are scheduled for completion by the end of the year.

Safety of course is of prime importance and LOOP has an exceptional record. The port continually prepares for an unlikely incident such as an oil spill. They have the most advanced recovery and remediation equipment available. Safety and oil spill drills are conducted regularly. To help prevent the port from a tanker accident, a 7,000 horse-power tractor tug was built to assist any tanker with loss of power or steering. This tug can also respond to an oil spill or a fire. It is equipped with a pump that can pump 15,000 gallons/minute of water and foam a distance of 250 feet. After 9/11, a sophisticated surveillance system to monitor all the facilities that they operate was brought on line. They have also added a dedicated security vessel to audit the safety zone around the port so they can field off any unwarranted attacks that could potentially take place as a ship is offloading. They are constantly working with federal, state, and local officials to address any security needs that could be placed against the port.

In addition to a short video, all of the above information was via a presentation by Barb Hestermann, one of LOOP's marketing and business development representatives. Barb has been in the oil industry for 25 years and with LOOP for 10.

A question about hurricane preparedness was asked. LOOP's location is excellent for offloading and distribution but very vulnerable to hurricanes. Safety of the workers is prime. They will suspend their marine operations and put off offloading tankers so that everyone can get off the platform in the case of tropical weather. However, they do need to supply crude to refineries up north and the Midwest who are not effected by a hurricane and still need the crude. If the marine terminal is shut down they will make deliveries from the underground storage facilities, again as long as they are not putting any employee in harms way. They have learned a lot about hurricanes since *Katrina*. They were only down for 4½ days, but were hampered by power losses and downed communications. *Ike* actually did more damage to the Galliano facility (from flooding) than either *Gustav* or *Katrina*, but they still managed to supply crude when asked.

A question was asked as to "how do you make your money?" LOOP changes a tariff of 49¢ to offload one barrel of crude from ship through the pipeline and to storage with a certain amount of free storage and redelivery out of the system. This is a bargain! Discounts are available to customers who do a lot of volume with LOOP.

From an idea that literally started out on the back of a napkin in 1970, followed by years of lobbying state and federal regulators, numerous environmental studies and engineering studies, LOOP finally came to fruition with Congress passing the Deepwater Port Act of 1974. At a cost of \$770 Million, LOOP has had some rough years starting out and reportedly lost \$40 Million during its first year. It is quite lucrative today with \$200 Million in cash reserves, but after 28 years, it does take upkeep and upgrading to keep it running. Over those 28 years, 7600 tankers have called at the port and they have offloaded about 8.4 Billion barrels of crude oil.

There had been some talk about a team of investors proposing to build a similar facility in Texas to be called TOPS (Texas Offshore Port System) but this has been put on hold. LOOP is still the only place in the United States where you can directly offload supertankers!

Draft Resources bill overhauls agency's leasing, royalties, ethics rules

Draft (pdf) by the House Natural Resources Committee's Democratic staff would forge a new Interior Department agency to govern oil and gas leasing on federal lands and waters while raising onshore royalty rates and tightening ethics rules.

The far-reaching bill also includes measures to improve planning for renewable energy development on public lands onshore and on the federal outer continental shelf.

The legislation has been in circulation as another panel -- the House Energy and Commerce Committee -- worked on a sweeping energy and climate change bill. Energy and Commerce Committee members approved that bill last week, and floor votes could take place as soon as this summer.

Aides to Natural Resources Chairman Nick Rahall (D-W.Va.) and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) did not provide comment by press time about whether the bills could be combined. But Rahall last week said he was eyeing additions to the House climate and energy bill.

Interior would see a major restructuring of its energy agencies under the draft Natural Resources Committee staff bill. All federal energy and mineral leasing programs would be consolidated within one bureau in Interior that would handle lease sales, inspection, enforcement and revenue collection.

Specifically, the energy portions of the Minerals Management Service and the Bureau of Land Management -- including oil and gas, wind, wave and solar programs -- would be combined into one new agency called the "Office of Federal Energy and Minerals Leasing."

That agency would be responsible for all aspects of leasing both onshore and offshore, including siting, development, regulation and collection of royalties. The director of the office would require Senate confirmation, unlike the head of MMS, which currently is the only major bureau within Interior whose top official does not require confirmation.

Employees currently working for BLM and other Interior agencies would be transferred to the new agency. All employees of the new office that conduct audits or compliance reviews would have to meet professional auditor qualifications.

Other royalty-related changes include elimination of the royalty-in-kind program, which allows industry to provide petroleum directly to Interior in lieu of royalty payments. An Interior inspector general report last year found that 19 employees, nearly one-third of the entire staff of the royalty-in-kind program, socialized with and received a wide array of gifts and gratuities from oil and gas companies with which the agency was conducting official business.

The bill also contains numerous ethics reforms aimed at correcting a host of problems at Interior, including the MMS scandal and numerous deficiencies outlined in a series of scathing reports by government watchdog agencies on how royalties are collected.

Employees of the new office would be prohibited from accepting a gift from, owning stock in or being employed by any entity engaged in "exploring for, developing, mining, transporting, processing, or trading energy or minerals."

The bill also contains a "revolving door" provision prohibiting employees from working for energy companies for one year after leaving Interior. Employees also would be subjected to financial disclosure requirements.

Violation of any of the ethics rules would be a felony.

The changes proposed by the legislation fall in line with those promised by Interior Secretary Ken Salazar. He has repeatedly promised to "clean up the mess" at Interior and to make restoring the department's integrity his highest priority. He also has been considering a reorganization of the agencies he oversees, including a fundamental restructuring of its royalty program.

"The place where we are most focused on looking at potential reorganization has to do with MMS and BLM," he said at a hearing earlier this month. An Interior spokesperson said the department is reviewing the draft bill.

"Secretary Salazar has worked and will continue to work with Chairman Rahall and Congress on reform initiatives that will help change how the Department of the Interior does business," said Interior spokeswoman Kendra Barkoff.

Other provisions in the bill would overhaul the system for energy development planning on federal lands and waters.

Provisions include new outer continental shelf "Regional Planning Councils" -- made up of federal and state officials, industry, tribes and other stakeholders -- that would undertake new strategic planning; joint BLM and Forest Service efforts to work with states planning for both renewable and traditional energy development; replacing the current administrative process for onshore public lands wind and solar projects with a commercial leasing program; and several other provisions.

The new office also would be required to prepare five-year onshore leasing programs for 11 Western states and Alaska, similar to the five-year plans currently required for offshore leasing.

Leasing, royalty changes

The bill also aims to pressure oil companies to develop leases more quickly while raising several industry costs.

It would create new "diligent development" rules for onshore and offshore leases while imposing new fees on nonproducing leases. It also would shorten initial onshore lease terms from 10 years to five and raise minimum royalty rates to 18.75 percent.

The bill also would repeal provisions in a major 2005 energy law that expanded the offshore royalty waiver program called "royalty relief."

And it would make a host of other changes aimed at improving Interior's royalty collections processes, which have been criticized in recent years by Interior's inspector general and the Government Accountability Office.

Oil industry officials and their allies quickly attacked the measure.

Andy Radford, a senior policy adviser with the American Petroleum Institute, said the bill would be harmful to domestic production, especially when viewed alongside separate Obama administration proposals to repeal several industry tax incentives. "You are looking at a real disincentive to investment and the development of resources," he said.

Added Patrick Creighton, a spokesman for the American Energy Alliance, a group that pushes for easing limits on domestic oil and gas drilling: "This latest proposal will only further restrict access to our vast domestic resources and increase the price of energy. Congress and the House Resources Committee would be well served to focus their time and efforts on policy that would increase domestic energy production, not further restrict domestic supply as this measure proposes."

The Wilderness Society's Dave Alberswerth, however, praised some provisions in the measure. "There are a number of fiscal reforms, royalty management reforms that are very laudable in that proposal," he said.

Alberswerth also lauded provisions aimed at pressuring companies to develop their current leases. The group has long alleged that Interior, under the Bush administration, was too aggressive in seeking to open new areas to leasing.

But Alberswerth is wary of plans to create a new Office of Federal Energy and Minerals Leasing within Interior, in light of the group's concerns that the agency has in the past prioritized energy development over other uses on public lands.

He said Interior does not need a "super leasing" office. "What we need is more balance in the way the public lands are managed," he said. The group has been discussing its concerns with majority staff on the Natural Resources Committee, he added.

Athan Manuel of the Sierra Club called the proposal a "mixed bag." He praised provisions aimed at helping develop offshore renewable energy. But he lamented the absence of new limits on offshore oil and gas leasing following the expiration of decades-old moratoria last year. "The bottom line for us is we don't want to see any new offshore drilling happen, and I am not sure this bill gets us there," he said.

Food Additives Part 2 of 2

Monosodium Glutamate (MSG)

Early in this century a Japanese chemist identified MSG as the substance in certain seasonings that added to the flavor of protein-containing foods. Unfortunately, too much MSG can lead to headaches, tightness in the chest, and a burning sensation in the forearms an the back of the neck. If you think you are sensitive to MSG, look at ingredient listings. Also, avoid hydrolyzed vegetable protein, or HVP, which may contain MSG.

Nitrite and Nitrate

Sodium nitrite and sodium nitrate are two closely related chemicals used for centuries to preserve meat. While nitrate itself is harmless, it is readily converted to nitrite. When nitrite combines with compounds called secondary amines, it forms nitrosamines, extremely powerful cancer-causing chemicals. The chemical reaction occurs most readily at the high temperatures of frying. Nitrite has long been suspected as being a cause of stomach cancer. Look for nitrite-free processed meats -- some of which are frozen, refrigeration reduces the need for nitrites -- at some health food and grocery stores. But regardless of the presence of nitrite or nitrosamines, the high-fat, high-sodium content of most processed meats should be enough to discourage you from choosing them. And don't cook with bacon drippings.

<u>Olestra</u>

Olestra, the fake fat recently approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), is both dangerous and unnecessary. Olestra was approved over the objection of dozens of leading scientists.

The additive may be fat-free but it has a fatal side-effect: it attaches to valuable nutrients and flushes them out of the body. Some of these nutrients -- called carotenoids -- appear to protect us from such diseases as lung cancer, prostate cancer, heart disease, and macular degeneration. The Harvard School of Public Health states that "the long-term consumption of olestra snack foods might therefore result in several thousand unnecessary deaths each year from lung and ,prostate cancers

and heart disease, and hundreds of additional cases of blindness in the elderly due to macular degeneration. Besides contributing to disease, olestra causes diarrhea and other serious gastrointestinal problems, even at low doses."

FDA certified olestra despite the fact that there are safe low-fat snacks already on the market. There is no evidence to show that olestra will have any significant effect on reducing obesity in America.

Despite being approved as safe by the FDA, all snacks containing olestra must carry a warning label (similar to one found on cigarettes) that states:

This Product Contains Olestra. Olestra may cause abdominal cramping and loose stools. Olestra inhibits the absorption of some vitamins and other nutrients. Vitamins A, D, E, and K have been added.

CSPI advises consumers to avoid all olestra foods, and urges major food manufacturers not to make olestra-containing products.

Potassium Bromate

This additive has long been used to increase the volume of bread and to produce bread with a fine crumb (the non-crust part of bread) structure. Most bromate rapidly breaks down to form innocuous bromide. However, bromate itself causes cancer in animals. The tiny amounts of bromate that may remain in bread pose a small risk to consumers. Bromate has been banned virtually worldwide except in Japan and the United States. It is rarely used in California because a cancer warning is required on the label.

Sulfites

Sulfites are a class of chemicals that can keep cut fruits and vegetables looking fresh. They also prevent discoloration in apricots, raisins, and other dried fruits; control "black spot" in freshly caught shrimp; and prevent discoloration, bacterial growth, and fermentation in wine. Until the early 80's they were considered safe, but CSPI found six scientific studies proving that sulfites could provoke sometimes severe allergic reactions. CSPI and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) identified at least a dozen fatalities linked to sulfites. All of the deaths occurred among

asthmatics. In 1985 Congress finally forced FDA to ban sulfites from most fruits and vegetables. Especially if you have asthma, be sure to consider whether your attacks might be related to sulfites. The ban does not cover fresh-cut potatoes, dried fruits, and wine.




