I hope everyone enjoys the rest of the summer and hope to see everyone at the August 23rd Meeting.





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

KEY OBSERVATIONS AND FINDINGS Benefits and Opportunities of Natural Gas Use, Transportation, and Production



INTRODUCTION

This report describes how natural gas and its associated liquids (lease condensate and natural gas plant liquids) contribute to the U.S. economy both at a national level and in terms of the economies of individual states. The economic contribution is estimated for the historical year of 2015 and is projected to 2040 under three scenarios drawn from EIA's AEO.

SCOPE

Economic impacts are measured in terms of the number of jobs that are supported, the wages paid for those jobs, and the total value added (that is, the contribution to the national GDP and to its constituent state products). A unique feature of this report is that it defines the natural gas value chain as going <u>"all the</u> <u>way through consumption" to</u> <u>include the economic activity</u> <u>of converting the natural gas</u> <u>to other products and useful</u> <u>energy services.</u>

BASE YEAR RESULTS

Shown below are the job counts, wages and value added by three segments of the natural gas value chain: "end use," "infrastructure," and "production." The end use segment is made up of the industries that convert natural gas and its associated liquids to electricity, petrochemical and other products and the industries that manufacture, sell, install and maintain gas-fired appliances and equipment used in the residential, commercial, vehicle and industrial sectors.

The end use segment is the largest of the three with 44% of the total jobs. The infrastructure segment— which is made up of gatherers, gas processing, petroleum refining, natural gas distribution, and propane distribution— contributes 31% of the 2015 total jobs. The production segment consisting of oil and gas production companies and their suppliers of goods and services— contributes the remaining 25% of 2015 total natural gas value chain jobs.

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


Estimates for total jobs (direct, indirect and induced) through 2040 are shown below for the three AEO cases. The growth rate in employment for the Reference Case is 1.0% per year from 2015 to 2040 when total jobs reach 5.3 million. Due to the increased amount of oil and gas produced and consumed in 2016 High Oli and Gas Resource Case, the rate of growth in employment is higher in that case at 1.6% per year. By 2040 there are 0.8 million more jobs compared to the Reference case. See Below.

EXPORTS

The natural gas value chain contributes substantially to U.S. exports of commodities. In 2015 gas-related exports totaled over \$37.6 billion. This includes primary hydrocarbons, refined petroleum products, petrochemicals, fertilizers, plastics and resins. The fastest growth in natural gas value chain exports are expected to be in LNG exports and petrochemicals with substantial growth also expected in pipeline natural gas and NGLs. Such exports are expected to grow at annual rates of 3.4% to 3.8% per year, which is 60% to 70% faster than the overall natural gas value chain.





The 2015 High Oil and Gas Resource Case falls in between the other two cases with an average growth rate in total employment of 1.4% per year. The results for wages show similar tends among the three cases.

The forecasted direct, indirect and induced value added for all three segments combined grows from \$550 billion in 2015 to \$902 billion in the Reference Case, an annual growth rate of 2.0%. The 2016 High Oll and Gas Resource Case has a higher growth rate of 2.3% per year and reaches \$980 billion by 2040. The 2015 High Oll and Gas Resource Case also grows faster (2.3% per year) than the Reference Case and reaches \$962 billion by 2040.

CONCLUSION:

The natural gas value chain touches all states and a large number of industrial sectors supporting 2.9% of all non-farm jebs and contributing 3.1% of the national economy (GDP). These centributions to the U.S. economy are expected to grow in the future under each of the AEO scenaries examined here.

It's More Than Just Rig Counts

At the start of the recent downturn in global oil prices, experts both inside and out of the industry relied on rig count data to be the grand indicator of how the industry was doing and when we might see signs of recovery from the tough financial times.

When the rig count dropped, industry experts lowered the lights, pulled up a seat right next to B.B. King, and joined in the chorus of "The Thrill is Gone." As the rig count now increases, the lights shine a little brighter, and in the distance, you can hear Journey's 1980s anthem, "Don't Stop Be-lievin" gradually grow louder as we prepare for potential recovery.

The industry and investors would, and in many cases, still rely too heavily on rig count activity to be the leading indicator as to where the industry and the market is headed. What needs to be recognized is that an increase in rig activity gives us promising data, but it doesn't necessarily mean that there are gains in reserves bases or profits made for completing a well for service companies. It's not to say that rig activity is somehow off-base or inaccurate, but looking solely to rig count activity gives you a limited view of what might or might not be happening. In order to the get full picture of our future, we need to look at a few different factors that are affecting oil and gas companies. The first is DUCS or drilled uncompleted wells.

DUCS are wells, particularly in shale formations, that have been drilled by producers but have not yet been made ready for production. During the recent oil downturn, new drilling and completion activity decreased and the number of DUCS increased. Right now there are 6,298 DUCS in the lower 48 states. While that might sound like a bad thing, the abundance of uncompleted wells allows the U.S. the ability to not only respond quickly to increases in domestic oil prices, but to respond with force.

The next item to look at when attempting to gauge the health of the oil and gas industry is the location. For instance, North Dakota recently issued allowance of an additional year to defer the completion of uncompleted wells. In some cases, companies will drill to uphold their obligations to secure acreage. However, some companies will not immediately complete the well in hopes that prices will rise and then they can move the well into production.

Some formations are more profitable for the industry at different prices. Back when oil was near \$90, the Bakken Formation, located in the North Dakota and Montana area, rig activity trailed that of the Permian and Eagleford Formation. The opposite was true when prices nose-dived. As a result, the reduction in drilling on the Bakken was more severe than that of both Permian and Eagleford formation.

The oil and gas sector has made steady advances in the way of exploration and production. The technology we now use allows companies to perform more thorough work in producing hydrocarbons. According to the co-founder of drillinginfo.com, Mark Nibbelink, "Production flows are nearly double what they were in boom times, and we are now doing it with rig counts that are 40 percent below 2014 levels." The oil and gas sector is resilient, and we will continue to advance our process and technology as we preserve energy security. As we prepare for the future of our industry, we must take into account all factors when preparing our next moves.

10 Things You Didn't Know About Clean Cities

Nearly 100 Clean Cities coalitions work to reduce petroleum use in communities across the country. Led by Clean Cities coordinators, coalitions are composed of businesses, fuel providers, vehicle fleets, state and local government agencies, and community organizations. These stakeholders come together to share information and resources, educate the public, help craft public policy, and collaborate on projects that reduce petroleum use.

10. For 20 years, the Energy Department's Clean Cities program has supported local actions to reduce oil consumption in transportation. But ever wonder how the program got its start? Clean Cities was created in response to the Energy Policy Act of 1992 to provide resources for required and voluntary adopters of alternative fuel vehicles.

9. Since the program started, local Clean Cities coalitions have grown from six in 1993 to nearly 100 today, representing almost 75 percent of the U.S. population. These coalitions -- which are made up of private companies, fuel suppliers, local governments, vehicle manufacturers and community organizations -- work to advance alternative fuel use by educating drivers and fleet owners, overcoming technical hurdles and collaborating on transportation projects.

8. Our National Parks are reducing air pollution and lowering their fuel costs as part of the Clean Cities National Parks Initiative. Check out a map of the National Parks Initiative partners to learn how they are using alternative fuels, incorporating advanced vehicle technologies into their fleets and educating park visitors about sustainable driving habits.

7. Clean Cities coalitions have helped deploy nearly 550,000 alternative fuel vehicles on the road today and in 2012 alone saved almost 400 million gallons of oil. More than 55 percent of this savings came from vehicles that run on natural gas.


6. In order to meet the fueling needs of these vehicles, Clean Cities helps develop fueling infrastructure across the country. The program installed nearly 1,500 charging and alternative fueling stations as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

5. Through the National Clean Fleets Partnership, Clean Cities works with large companies to integrate alternative fuels and fuel economy improvements in their fleets. Since President Obama announced the initiative in 2011, more than 20 partners, including FedEx and UPS, have joined the National Clean Fleets Partnership. These partners represent some of the nation's largest commercial fleets and collectively operate more than 1 million vehicles.

4. Clean Cities has funded more than 500 transportation projects nationwide that leveraged more than \$740 million in funds from other organizations in the public and private sectors.

3. In 2012 alone, Clean Cities activities -- which include idle-reduction measures and fuel economy improvements -- helped prevent nearly 7 million tons of greenhouse gas emissions. That's like taking nearly 2 million cars off the road for an entire year. 2. Clean Cities has saved nearly 5.4 billion gallons of petroleum since 1993. In the past six years, Valley of the Sun Clean Cities coalition in Phoenix, Twin Cities Clean Cities in Minnesota and Southern California Clean Cities have displaced a total of about 135 million gallons of gasoline each.

Did you know: There are nearly 11,900 public plug-in electric vehicle and alternative fueling stations across the U.S. Whether you are looking for hydrogen, biodiesel, natural gas or electric charging stations, the Alternative Fuels Data Center -- the clearinghouse for Clean Cities' alternative fuel and vehicle information -- maps out the different fueling locations available across the country.
