### Desk and Derrick Club of the Westbank College Scholarship Guidelines

#### **General Guidelines for All Applicants:**

- **1.** Must submit application through an active Westbank Desk and Derrick member. All active Westbank Club Members are encouraged to apply for the Scholarship, provided they meet the guidelines.
- 2. Graduating High School Seniors must provide copies of both GPA and ACT scores. Proof of cumulative GPA with a minimum of 2.75 and ACT of 23 is needed to qualify. These scores must be on an official transcript with student name.
- 2a. All High School Seniors must provide a Letter of Acceptance from the College or University attending.
- 2b. Current college students must submit proof of cumulative GPA of 2.75 or higher on an official transcript with student name.
- 3. All applicants must submit completed application form, including all requested documentation to your Desk and Derrick Sponsor by March 1st.
- 4. No applicant will be granted more than four annual Scholarship Awards (need not be four consecutive years).
- 5. All applicants must provide at least one letter of recommendation in addition to your Desk and Derrick Sponsor or immediate family member.
- 6. All applicants must provide a letter or essay detailing intended field or study and educational goals.

Desk and Derrick Sponsor Responsibilities: The Desk and Derrick Sponsor must write and submit a letter to the committee detailing their personal knowledge of the applicant. This letter, the application, and all attachments, MUST be submitted to the Scholarship Chairman or be postmarked by March 15th and mailed to: Desk and Derrick Club of the Westbank Scholarship Chairman, P. O. Box 2875, Gretna, La. 70053-2875. Incomplete applications or those received after the deadline will be disqualified.

Scholarship awards will be issued from available funds no later than June 30th of each year. Scholarship checks will be issued jointly to the scholarship recipient and the appropriate College/ University. Scholarship checks must be cashed within the 180-day time period as per banking regulations, or the funds will be forfeited.







## **LOGA's Resolutions for a Prosperous Louisiana**

The Christmas season has come and gone, and now we are headed into the final stretch of the holiday season. The New Year has become synonyms with the sounds of champagne bottles popping, fireworks, the ball drop in Time Square, and New Year's resolutions. According to the Statistic Brain Research Institute, over 50 percent of Americans make some kind of resolution for the new year. I believe that it is vital to set goals or resolutions for the upcoming year, especially when it comes to the health of Louisiana's oil and gas industry.

The first of many resolutions for Louisiana's oil and gas sector is to continue the progress of the Bayou Bridge Pipeline. The project, which is set to begin construction very shortly, will stretch from Nederland, TX to a terminal in Lakes Charles and then a finally end at the St. James terminal hub. This \$750 million pipeline project will create approximately 2,500 construction jobs. Along with a boost in jobs, the Bayou Bridge Pipeline provides the safest and most efficient way to transport crude across Louisiana. It is projects like these that are needed to boost economic development and create jobs in Louisiana.

The "Texodus," as coined by a Baton Rouge political writer, refers to the mass migration out of Louisiana. Stopping the trend of outward migration is resolution number 2. ## Oil trading above \$60 a barrel

Oil continued its revival from the biggest crash in a generation, with prices set for a second annual gain after a year marked by hurricanes, Middle East conflict and the tussle between OPEC and U.S. shale.

Crude as trading at \$60.07 a barrel in New York at about 7:40 a.m. Central time. Oil has not settled above \$60 a barrel since June 2015.

Futures are up more than 11 percent in 2017, having entered a bull market in September. The year's gains were driven by output cuts by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries and Russia, along with geopolitical tensions in the Middle East and pipeline disruptions from the North Sea to Canada and Libya. In 2018, investors will watch whether the price recovery triggers a new flood of U.S. output.

## U.S. Government Stops Offshore Safety Study

The U.S. government has halted an independent scientific study of its offshore oil and gas inspections.

The Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement (BSEE) has ordered the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine to suspend all work on a study designed to review and update the Bureau's offshore oil and gas inspection program to enhance safety. BSEE was established following the 2010 *Deepwater Horizon* explosion and oil spill that killed 11 people.

The stop-work order, dated December 7, says that within 90 days the stop-work order will either be lifted and work on the study can resume or the contract to perform the study will be terminated. The committee conducting the study held its first and only meeting (to date) in Washington, D.C. on October 26-27. Future meetings planned to be held in the Gulf of Mexico region have been put on hold.

The National Academies have issued a statement saying they are "disappointed that their important study has been stopped."

This is the second National Academies study halted by the Department of the Interior in the last four months. In August, a study on the potential health effects for people living near surface coal mining sites in Central Appalachia was stopped pending a review of contracts. The National Academies have not received any update on the status of that review, and the study remains on hold. "Given how important this study is to the citizens and communities surrounding these surface mining sites in Appalachia, the National Academies believe the study should be completed and are exploring options to do so," said the National Academies. Some private donors have expressed an interest in funding the completion of the study.

The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine are private, nonprofit institutions that provide independent, objective analysis and advice to the nation. They operate under an 1863 congressional charter to the National Academy of Sciences, signed by President Lincoln.

#### TGS plans to expand its 3D seismic coverage in the deepwater Gulf of Mexico.

Alonso 3D is a multi-client survey of 6,172 sq km (2,383 sq mi) located in the Atwater Valley and Lloyd Ridge protraction areas of the US Gulf of Mexico. Multi-level targets exist, from Miocene to Jurassic.

This project, the company claims, allows it to extend coverage from a core area in Mississippi Can-

yon into a more frontier area that is experiencing renewed interest from E&P companies. TGS will acquire new 3D data to provide the higher spatial resolution required to delineate multiple plays at multiple levels.

Acquisition is expected to begin in February 2018. Data processing will be performed by the company using its Clari-FiTM broadband technology.

# The U.S. oil rig count rose by about 42 percent by end-2017 compared to the corresponding period last year, as energy companies boosted spending amid a recovery in crude prices.

Drillers held the number of oil rigs steady for a second straight week at 747 in the week to Dec. 29. That was 222 more than the 525 rigs at the end of 2016, according to General Electric Co's Baker Hughes Inc energy services firm.

The oil rig count, an early indicator of future output, remained unchanged in December after rising by 10 in November. It declined by 3 in the fourth quarter after falling by 6 in the third quarter.

U.S. oil prices closed above \$60 a barrel for the first time since mid-2015 on the final trading day of the year, ending 2017 with a 12 percent gain spurred by strong demand and declining global inventories. Oil prices had been boosted by signs the global crude glut that has dogged the market since 2014 is shrinking, as a year of production cuts led by Middle East-dominated Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) and Russia helped tighten the market.


OPEC cuts kicked off last January and are scheduled to continue throughout 2018. In 2017, U.S. crude futures have averaged about \$51 a barrel, easily topping last year's \$43.47 average. Looking ahead, futures were trading at about \$59 for the balance of 2018 and \$56 for calendar 2019.
