BE PREPARED FOR A HURRICANE

Threats from hurricanes include powerful winds, heavy rainfall, storm surges, coastal and inland flooding, rip currents, tornadoes, and landslides.

Hurricanes are massive storm systems that form over warm ocean waters and move toward land. The Atlantic hurricane season runs June 1 to November 30. The Pacific hurricane season runs May 15 to November 30.



Can happen along any U.S. coast or territory in the Atlantic or Pacific



Can affect areas more than 100 miles inland



Most active in September

IF YOU ARE UNDER A HURRICANE WARNING, FIND SAFE SHELTER RIGHT AWAY



Determine your best protection for high winds and flooding.



Evacuate if told to do so.



Take shelter in a designated storm shelter or an interior room for high winds.



Listen for emergency information and alerts.



Only use generators outdoors and away from windows.



Do not walk, swim, or drive through flood waters.

HOW TO STAY SAFE WHEN A HURRICANE THREATENS





Sign up for your community's warning system. The Emergency Alert System (EAS) and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts.

If you are at risk for flash flooding, watch for signs such as heavy rain.

Practice going to a safe shelter for high winds, such as a FEMA safe room or ICC 500 storm shelter. The next best protection is a small, interior, windowless room in a sturdy building on the lowest level that is not subject to flooding.

Based on your location and community plans, make your own plans for evacuation or sheltering in place.

Become familiar with your evacuation zone, the evacuation route, and shelter locations.

Gather needed supplies for at least three days. Keep in mind each person's specific needs, including medication. Don't forget the needs of pets.

Keep Important documents in a safe place or create password-protected digital copies.

Protect your property. Declutter drains and gutters. Install check valves in plumbing to prevent backups. Consider hurricane shutters. Review insurance policies.



If told to evacuate, do so immediately. Do not drive around barricades.

If sheltering during high winds, go to a FEMA safe room, ICC 500 storm shelter, or a small, interior, windowless room or hallway on the lowest floor.

If trapped in a building by flooding, go to the highest level of the building. Do not climb into a closed attic. You may become trapped by rising flood water.

Listen for current emergency information and instructions.

Use a generator or other gasolinepowered machinery ONLY outdoors and away from windows.

Do not walk, swim, or drive through flood waters. Turn Around. Don't Drown." Just six inches of fast-moving water can knock you down, and one foot of moving water can sweep your vehicle away.

Stay off bridges over fast-moving water.



Listen to authorities for information and special instructions.

Be careful during clean-up. Wear protective clothing and work with someone else.

Do not touch electrical equipment if it is wet or if you are standing in water. If it is safe to do so, turn off electricity at the main breaker or fuse box to prevent electric shock.

Avoid wading in flood water, which can contain dangerous debris. Underground or downed power lines can also electrically charge the water.

Save phone calls for emergencies. Phone systems are often down or busy after a disaster. Use text messages or social media to communicate with family and friends.

Document any property damage with photographs. Contact your insurance company for assistance.

Go to ready.gov and search for hurricane. Download the FEMA app to get more information about preparing for a hurricane.

Terrebonne Parish Won't Sue Oil and Gas Industry

Terrebonne Parish will not sue the oil and gas industry for wetlands damage despite Gov. John Bel Edwards encouraging coastal parishes to do so.

On Wednesday, Edwards said if parishes do not file lawsuits, then the state will on their behalf and is sending them letters to that effect.

Parish President Gordy Dove said he received Terrebonne's letter on Thursday evening.

"They want all the parishes to file a suit in which Department of Natural Resources Secretary Thomas Harris will then intervene, and should you not do so in 30 days from the date of this letter then Secretary Harris will do it," Dove said of the letter.

While Lafourche Parish has also indicated it won't sue the industry, Plaquemines, Cameron, Jefferson and Vermillion parishes have filed suits. Dove said other parishes should see how the cases in Jefferson and Plaquemines proceed.

"To sue an industry that's Terrebonne's bread and butter and Lafourche's bread and butter, we shouldn't sue any industry until investigation is done," Dove said. "This is a money grab by a handful of trial attorneys who have one thing in mind. They think that they'll make a lot of money, but what happens to Terrebonne and Lafourche? This is not going to get solved overnight."

Terrebonne and Lafourche previously hired attorneys to investigate legal action, but neither filed suit.

During a June Lafourche Parish Council meeting, Gerald Block of Block Law Firm said if a state entity files on behalf of Lafourche instead of the parish filing suit, then the parish would only get a portion of the damages.

Dove said that he did not find that to be true. He added that if a parish filed suit and loses, which he thinks it would, it could be left with "millions and millions of dollars" in legal costs.

Lafourche Parish President Jimmy Cantrelle could not be reached for comment Thursday night.

"I would like to make it clear that Lafourche Parish has no intention of filing suit against any oil company," Cantrelle previously said. "We have never considered joining or filing a lawsuit. The council was simply asked to retain legal representation to assist in quantifying potential damages the parish may have incurred through coastal use permits and activities associated with them. The parish needs to preserve its rights should the State of Louisiana bring forward some sort of settlement with the energy industry and retaining counsel allows us to preserve those rights."

The Louisiana Oil and Gas Association and the Louisiana Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association issued a joint statement against Edwards' position.

"The reality is the administration already has every tool it needs to protect the coast," the statement read in part. "The State and Local Coastal Resources Management Act provides for an exhaustive set of fines and penalties that can be levied by the Department of Natural Resources to enforce the terms of state issued permits. But issuing fines and penalties for alleged violations, as the department is required to do by state law, doesn't produce billions in legal fees."

"Whatever their outcome, these lawsuits are not a funding mechanism for state or local government budgets and they will not help protect the coast," the statement adds. "On the contrary, they divert critical time and resources away from the industry's support of Louisiana's coastal restoration efforts, which have been underway for decades."

The associations said the oil and natural gas industry is the largest private investor in the state's coast. And working with the industry's companies would be more productive than a legal battle.
